

From the President's Desk Good News You Can Believe

Bob Dylan once wrote, "The times, they are a changin'." The rapid pace of change and information is staggering for us today. The television screen has more than just the talking head delivering the news. There are rows of information scrolling across the bottom and even the sides of the screen. Even choosing which network from which one seeks to receive the news is a dicey situation.

There is so much news that people filter which news you receive and what analysis they provide into such news. Finally, we have no crossed over into an era of "fake news." News of questionable veracity has gone far beyond the check=out line at the grocery store. Threats to our nation now come in the form of "Troll Farms/Factories" where hackers create such fake news and disseminate it through social media. When it comes to the news today, who can you believe? How do you know that news is true?

When the angels appeared to the shepherds on the night of Jesus' birth, they announced to them that they had "good news." This is a word ripe with meaning. Particularly in Isaiah's prophecies, we hear about the promised Messiah who would bring good news to the people. In Isaiah chapter 40, The grass withers, the flower fades, but the word of our God will stand forever. Go on up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good news; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good news; lift it up, fear not; say to the cities of Judah, "Behold your God!" God's people had not known good news for a long time. They had been promised that the Messiah would come and would bring with Him good news, but the people had waited and waited. Were such promises fake news? Were they words from a charlatan rather than a faithful God?

No! When the time had fully come, God sent His Son to be the fulfillment of those true and certain promises. In appearing to the shepherds, the angel is the herald who announces that God has kept His promise. "Fear not, for behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord."

The angel's announcement is not the product of deceit but a true promise. For thousands of years the people had been waiting for God to keep His Word. When the shepherds behold the promised Messiah, they know that the good news that was announced true. This child came to bring peace between God and His wayward creation. This baby came to bring joy to people who had known only despair. This Messiah came to bring good news of the Kingdom of God coming near to people who lived under the oppression of sinful, selfish, earthly kings.

After Jesus' ascension, the book of Acts is an account of how the good news is spread to the far reaches of the known world. Philip, Peter, Barnabas and Paul are all heralds as they proclaim the good news of peace through Jesus. As this Good News of the Gospel is proclaimed and taught today, God is still fulfilling His promise as heralds announce the Good News of the Messiah. Even though the word is spoken by sinful people this news is true and it is good because it gives joy and peace to all who believe.

As you celebrate our Savior's birth, may you be filled with the same joy and peace as those shepherds who heard the Good News proclaimed by the herald angels. May God bless your celebrations with your church family and all your loved ones! You can count on this good news! "Fear not, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord!"

Building Friendships with Immigrants and Refugees for the Gospel

When Tim Schrader's sister became a missionary in west Africa, he didn't realize it would have a profound impact on his life in St. Louis. Once she was back in America, his sister got involved with a local RSO of the LCMS, the Christian Friends of New Americans (CFNA).

With a network of partners, CFNA works with immigrants and refugees in St. Louis, offering a wide array of services, including English classes, social connections, spiritual development and much more. Refugees in particular often have a hard time adjusting, because they came here as a result of war in their home country.

Tim's sister encouraged him to volunteer as well. He volunteers with their furniture delivery program, afterschool tutoring and helping with medical appointments. He says, "Refugees are wonderful people. They're a lot of fun and they need a lot of help and it's a joy to give it to them."



Tim has seen many refugees struggle as they acclimate to their new life in St. Louis. Learning English is a significant challenge. In fact, many refugees have valuable skills but have trouble finding working due to language or certification issues.

Tim has found that the simple act of delivering furniture has a profound impact on refugee families, because they have very little material possessions with which to build their new home. After Tim brings the donated furniture into their homes, he offers a prayer. He says that no matter what religious background they are, they always welcome his prayers.



He says, "They don't always want the Gospel, but they want to be my friend. So, we just keep trying."

Why Bring Kids to Church?

"If my kids are in church, I don't get anything out of it." "My kid can't sit that long." "I don't want to disrupt the people around us." These are some of the things I've heard over the years when people are asked why they aren't in church as a family.

I have no doubt that those are actual concerns of parents. They are all true statements. Little children can be disturbing to others, the parents won't get as much out of the worship experience, and when kids are little, they aren't used to sitting that long. But it's worth it!

I don't remember where to point for these statistics, and it has been a couple of years since I read this, but a study showed the reasons why children stay in church.

The top two reasons that kids ultimately stay in church is, they were able to talk to their moms about God, and their dad sang in church.

Those may sound too simple, but it makes sense. When a child sees the value of a relationship with God through conversation and active participation in worship in parents, it stands a much better chance of having lasting value for them.

No matter how often our children, especially as they enter the teen years, will say they don't care about what their parents do, they are watching, and they do actually care. Family worshiping together has value.

I could dissect the opening statements and tell you why they are only "excuses", but I would rather share how my congregation has made it important to have the "disruption," the getting up and down,

and parents getting something out of it as well as the kids. At our church, we celebrate the noise. That's not to say that we applaud a child crying, or throwing things.

What we emphasize is that if these noises weren't there, we would be dying.

What we don't do, as leadership or as fellow members, is tell them they should leave or give a glare, or whisper to our spouse, or move. Don't tell the kids sitting in our pews, but I love it when a child breaks free and runs down the center aisle. I love it when a little one says something during the sermon. We will laugh when those moments happen. We may make a joke. Sure, I've had the voice tug-of-war with a child, increasing volume as they increased theirs. But I'd rather have that than no kids. That's the atmosphere the church should convey if they want kids in church. And we do right?

Having said all that, here's the number one reason kids should be in church. God wants them there.

You've heard those verses where Jesus calls the children to Him. He wants them close, He wants them to be gathered, and He wants us to not hinder them.

Worship is about being fed by God through His Word and Sacrament. His Word comes to us in EVERYTHING we do in worship, not just the sermon or readings. There is a sacrifice made by parents bringing their kids to church. Being a parent has a lot of sacrifices and a lot of joys too. The sacrifices are worth it, and are only temporary. Our faith is important to us. Having our families worship

together shows its importance. How will our children know if we don't show them?


