WHY IS TEACHING THE FAITH IN THE HOME SO IMPORTANT? By Rev. Dr. Lee Hagan

There are three compelling reasons why the Church should devote energy and resources to equipping families to teach the faith in the home.

First, God's Word establishes the paradigm of parents teaching the faith to their children in Deuteronomy 6. What is described in those verses is not a naïve description of families that are completely unfamiliar to us today, but rather families that are on the move. God's design for families is that His Word is to be regularly taught by those whom God has given charge of His children.

Another reason why the Church should equip families to teach the faith in the home flows from Martin Luther's charge in his Small Catechism. When Luther witnessed the deplorable conditions of the churches in Germany in his day, he set out to develop a tool for families to use in teaching



children within the home. His vision, rooted in the Scriptures, was for parents to teach their children to pray and the basics of the Christian faith. From the early days of the Reformation, Lutherans have sought to equip families to teach and pray the faith in the home.

Lastly, research continues to bear out that families are the primary influences on children and youth. The Search Institute 2008 study "With Their Own Voices," states, "Because of the pivotal role of family in child and adolescent development, it is not surprising that family rose to the top as a primary resource for spiritual development from young people's perspective."

Our hope is that Tell the Next Generation will have a ripple effect across the congregations in the Missouri District, one that today's children can carry forward in their own future families. Long after this event has concluded, I pray that you will take the wisdom and ideas home to your ministries, to encourage and equip families as they raise their children in the faith.
