# From the President's Desk A Great and Mighty Wonder

During my years in parish ministry, the weeks of Advent were indeed a time of preparation. Sermon preparation, that is. One of the ways that I would prepare was to read the sermons and meditations of great teachers of the faith down through the centuries. I was always blessed by the Word as it was taught by the pen of Martin Luther and John Gerhard, in particular. Gerhard's Sacred Meditations is a gem for pastors and laity alike to the read and ponder. As we once again reflect upon God's promise of His messiah and the fulfillment of His prophecies in the birth of Christ, there is so much for which we marvel. The crude surroundings. The virgin birth. The faithful earthly father. The absence of the finery fit for a king. The unlikely first worshippers. God becoming a baby boy. For some two thousand years, preachers and poets have labored to describe their marvel at the Christmas story. Though you have heard the story and sung the hymns many times before and will hear a sermon that may not provide nothing "new," you will once again be amazed at the Word made flesh as the Babe of Bethlehem.

Here is a portion of one of Luther's reflections. He writes, "Look upon this Lord of Peace and your spirit will be at peace. See how God invites you in many ways. He places before you a babe with whom you may take refuge. You cannot fear him, for nothing is more appealing to man than a babe. Are you affrighted? Then come to him, lying in the lap of the fairest and sweetest maid. You will see how great is the divine goodness, which seeks above all else that you should not despair. Trust him! Trust him! Here is the Child in whom is salvation. To me there is no greater consolation given to mankind than this, that Christ became man, a child, a babe, playing in the lap and at the breasts of his most gracious mother. Who is there whom this sight would not comfort? Now is overcome the power of sin, death, hell, conscience, and guilt, if you come to judge this gurgling Babe and believe that he is come not to judge you, but to save." (Martin Luther's Christmas Book, p. 33)

Gerhard's "The Mystery of the Incarnation" captures well the many facets of our Savior's birth for which we can ponder. He writes, "O let us admire the marvelous goodness of our God, who, when we could not ascend to Him hesitated not to descend to us. Let us stand in wonder at the marvelous power of our God, who was able to unite in one two natures so diverse as the divine and human, so that one and

the same Person is now both God and man. Let us admire the marvelous wisdom of our God, who could devise a scheme for our redemption, which neither angels, not men could have devised...Let us stand in wonder at this mystery, but let us not too curiously pry into it. Let us desire reverently to study it, although we cannot fully understand it." (p. 80-81)

May the marvel of Christ's birth bring you joy and hope always!

# Musical Fine Arts in Our Lutheran Schools

We have all experienced the power of music. Research shows that music activates several regions in the brain stimulating new neuropathways, impacting our mood, reducing stress, connecting to others, and even helping us to recall information. Music is weaved throughout our everyday lives from the visual arts, dance, to theatre. We are designed to be social creatures and music is one of those gifts God has provided giving us that opportunity to connect with others.

In Ephesians, we learn about being imitators of God, walking in love and being a fragrant offering "addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with your heart." (Ephesians 5:19) And our Lutheran schools across Missouri are immersed in utilizing a wide range of musical fine arts. These opportunities serve not only for students to learn and grow, but also as a powerful witnessing tool to our community.

Take, for instance, Immanuel St. Charles. Since 1986, Immanuel has intentionally brought congregational adults and students grades four through eight together in instrumental, choral, and colorful acting to share the good news of Christ's birth through a medieval Boar's Head Christmas Festival. Calvary in Kansas City creates connections by students going caroling right before Christmas break. Many elementary schools also have musical fine arts programs, like Zion Harvester's Fiddle Festival and Lutheran High in St. Charles who utilizes jazz, choral opportunities in worship, and even theatre to push their students to take a more active role in production, directing, and performance.

Lutheran Schools are and continue to build generations of leaders by helping them hone their God given gifts and abilities putting themselves out there utilizing musical fine arts to bring people together as Martin Luther said, "there are, without a doubt, in the human heart many seed-grains of precious virtue which are stirred up by music." This December, may God bless you and your family through the gift of music celebrating our Savior's birth.

# **International Campus Ministry in Missouri**

The Great Commission in Matthew tells us to "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you…" (Matthew 28:19) So often this verse is used in sending missionaries to far away countries, but did you know that there is a way to reach "all nations", right in your own backyard?

International students at universities and colleges are eager to learn about American customs and culture. This includes learning about religion. Campus Lutheran in Columbia, located right next to the University of Missouri, has a thriving church and campus ministry. One unique aspect of this busy congregation is their ministry to international scholars. Different than an undergraduate student, often international scholars visit for about a year's time to master the English language, bringing their family with them. A wonderful blessing and connection for students is Beth Greimann, an English Language Learner instructor at University of Missouri. Beth also serves as the Director of International Ministry at Campus Lutheran.

"It has come as a natural outreach," says Beth. While teaching at the university, she is allowed to answer any questions that the students have. And there are easy ways to use Campus Lutheran as a resource, like inviting students to experience Thanksgiving dinner or inviting them to a free English class on Friday mornings at the church. She also teaches a class "Authentic Writing Using Recipes and Cooking", for which she can utilize Campus Lutheran's kitchen.

There are many aspects to this ministry, that together, help foster building relationships. For example, there is a free "garage sale" where a number of household items are set up and available for international students. There are always plenty of events, like Easter egg hunts, pumpkin carvings, family fun night. By making sure there is another event scheduled, there is a welcome invitation. Keeping the relationship going can be as simple as having a postcard prepared with the upcoming event information. Plus, there are plenty of meals to be shared.

The harvest does not return empty. In addition to creating many friendships over the years, and planting the seeds of Christianity in students, Campus Lutheran has been blessed to experience the fruit of the Holy Spirit firsthand. There are baptisms that can come out of these relationships, and even a Christian marriage!

# **Christ in an Ever-Changing Community**

About every two to three years, a change in command takes place at Whiteman Air Force Base in Missouri. While this is typical of military life, it adds a unique challenge to ministry when relationships with many neighbors are continually beginning and ending. Faith Lutheran in Knob Noster understands the Whiteman community, however, and is ready to share the Gospel with service personnel and their loved ones—regardless of how long they remain in the neighborhood.

The congregation brings consistency to an area always in flux and has established itself as a reliable resource for the Whiteman AFB community. This was very clear when Pastor Jon- Michael Schweigert and members of Faith pitched the idea of hosting Vacation Bible School on base to the new wing chaplain...and were approved!

"The secret to making VBS happen was to tap into the relationships we had built over years," says Pastor Schweigert. "It also helps to remember that everyone involved wants the children to grow closer to God. Our job was just to show how we could amplify what the base already wanted to do." In July 2022, Faith Lutheran hosted "God's Wonder Lab" VBS for five days on base. More than sixty children heard about the miracles of Jesus and did science experiments together.

The state of Missouri contains so many varied neighborhoods—small farming communities, college campuses, urban centers, suburban areas, military bases, and more. The people living in these environments may be lifelong residents or simply passing through for a short time. Regardless of their length of stay among us, the Missouri District stands ready to support congregations and schools in mission and ministry. The way you amplify this work in God's Kingdom through your partnership with the District continues to be a source of great joy. YouthLead is an exciting new opportunity for high school youth. It combines our previous leadership efforts in Missouri District leadership by taking the training elements of Peer Ministry Training (PMT) with the community of leaders in Lutheran Youth Fellowship (LYF). Our goal is to train and encourage youth in Gospel-centered leadership across Missouri.

Our youth will receive practical training to help prepare them to be leaders in their own churches and community. "Motivated by Love" will walk our youth through learning to listen, ask, seek, share, invite, and encourage their peers as they share their faith. They will also learn practical skills like how to lead a devotion. Julianna Schults from LCMS Youth Ministry Training will lead the training for our youth. Our goal is to focus on growing in our relationship with Jesus Christ and our relationships with others with Christ at the center.

Another major component of YouthLead is having a mentor to walk alongside these high school youth. Mentors will work with a YouthLead trainer to recognize and encourage youth leadership in our congregations and communities. So this weekend of training is open to adult mentors also.
