From the President's Desk

An Unchanging Word for a Changing World

You've heard the joke about how many Lutherans does it take to change a lightbulb. The point of the joke is that there is a tension among Lutherans about change. However, the issue is no joking matter. We need to be clear about change as we sit in climate-controlled buildings and hear the message service generally in English through a sound system that Lutherans are not against change. Our church body is no longer known as "Die Deutsche Evangelish-Lutherische Synode von Missouri, Ohio und andern Staaten" (The German Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and other States). We have changed.

In a time in our country when so many things are changing though, we should be clear about what can and even should change and what must not change. Many of our congregations are changing as the communities surrounding them change. Congregations that were once comprised of children of German immigrants now include immigrants from other nations. Parishioners in the church pew may follow along to the Scripture readings on their phone rather than reading out of a pew Bible. There are many ways in which our congregations are changing in our world today.

However, the things that do not change are the almighty God and His revealed Word. What a comfort it is to know that in a culture of constant change, our Lord remains the same, yesterday, today and forever. His Word, likewise, is true and sure and does not "change with the times." Neither does the Church's confession change. We may be answering different questions than in previous times, but we continue to confess what we have learned from the Scriptures and the Lutheran Confessions.

As a parish pastor, I would encourage members to attend "new member classes" to get to know those who were interested in joining the congregation and as a refresher on the basics of the Christian faith. One evening I was interrupted during a class by an older member who wanted me to know that what I had just said was what the pastor at the congregation had said in her confirmation class sixty-five years earlier because she had written it in the margin of her copy of Luther's Small Catechism. She was encouraged to see so clearly how our confession does not change.

It is a comfort to young and old alike that the congregations of the Synod do not change our public confession of the faith. We do need to address issues that were not facing the Church in previous times, but God and His Word remain the same. Our prayer is that our congregations will adapt and even change to reach their communities and in service to the proclamation of the

Gospel in matters that are neither commanded, nor forbidden by Scripture. Finally, may our congregations and those who serve as pastors and servants in the Church, be faithful in teaching God's unchanging Word in this ever-changing world.

On July 1, 2022, the state of Missouri launched MOScholars—a new tax credit program to provide educational scholarships for qualifying K-12 students attending private institutions. The Missouri District of the LCMS is blessed to be an Educational Assistance Organization within this program, enabling us to use the tax dollars of participants to walk with students and their families as they seek to defray the cost of tuition at our Lutheran schools. The inaugural year was a success—providing 97 full and partial scholarships to students attending 24 LCMS schools.

For CCLS Academy at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in north St. Louis, MOScholars was a sustainable funding source for this brand-new micro-school. "Here in the Hyde Park area, we serve underserved families that are mostly low to moderate income," says Principal Tequila Pruitt. "Through the MOScholars program, we are now able to provide these families with scholarships to afford a quality education."

Directing your taxes to Lutheran education through this program is as simple as completing an online form and pre-paying a portion of your taxes in the amount of your credit reservation. At no additional cost and with minimal effort, MOScholars allows taxpayers to decide how their tax dollars should be spent. Directing these tax dollars for scholarships to attend Lutheran schools is a blessing to children and families that will make an eternal difference. "We're so thankful for all of you who were willing to participate in 2022, but we also invite you to come back onboard in 2023," concludes President Lee Hagan. "It's a win-win situation for all of us."

LEARN Visit our special page for Rostered Church Worker Residential Loans at lcef.org/HomeLoans to learn about our mortgage program.

PRICE How much can you afford? Use a mortgage calculator to help determine your price range. Then, get pre-approval before you start looking at homes. This will also help when submitting an offer!

SAVE Determine how much you need for the down payment and closing and start saving.

DEBT AND PURCHASES Don't purchase any big items with credit or open new lines of credit (loans, vehicles, boats, furniture) leading up to your home purchase.

DEPOSITS Large deposits will require a signed explanation and documentation verifying the source of the funds.

ORGANIZE Take time to organize call papers, your spouse's pay stubs, two years of W2s and other important documents, so you're ready for the application process.

HISTORY Self-employment Income requires a two-year history as evidenced by two years of tax returns.
