After breakfast, the group divided, parents had education time and kids got to play and explore and with the excellent camp counselors. After lunch, parents got to put into action what was learned in the morning. The days ended with community fun time and devotions around a fire pit. One attendee noted, "I have learned so much in the time that we've been here. It's exactly what I needed to hear."

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Ministry in Spanish Lake

"So shall my word be that goes out from my mouth; it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it." Isaiah 55:11

In the thick of any ministry, it can be easy to become discouraged by the context around you. In Urban ministry, this feeling seems to be accelerated in many ways by the geographical and sociological factors that come into play as well. It can be difficult to see the ways in which God is moving when you feel as if there are so many challenges. Has God left the building? Is His Word still working?

At St. Peter Lutheran Church in Spanish Lake—The Word of God is going out and not returning void. The church oversees a small farm in its backyard that grows plants/produce for the community. While the produce grows in the backyard from small seeds, the people of God grow in His House from small seeds as well—the ministry starts with the children.

Through the Bethlehem Lutheran Church Northside Urban Ministry Coalition (NUMC), new life is coming back to the community through the lives of young people. In an intentional partnership with neighborhood schools, the Spanish Lake Campus was able to serve over 75 different kids this school year with intentional after school programming. Each child not only received a healthy meal and a safe place to be after school, but they also received the Word of God through biblical study and devotion with loving Christian adults at our program. The Seeds of Hope Farm in the backyard of the congregation provided important agricultural learning as our kids learned about healthy habits/eating from the farmers! The ministry continues this summer as we invited those same children to attend full day Summer Camp! What an awesome summer it will be as we spread the Gospel for 8 hours a day at camp.

This is also an exciting time as God is adding new workers to the harvest to serve and help in the Spanish Lake Community. In addition to Pastor Bolling serving as Lead Pastor at Bethlehem, we have also brought on a new Associate Pastor—Pastor Chris Knepper. Pastor Knepper's role is be focused on community engagement on the Northside for our ministry sites—one of which is Spanish Lake. The goal is to engage Team Ministry so that the Gospel of Hope can be planted in many hearts and minds within the Spanish Lake community.

On the first day of summer camp—the kids planted seeds and were encouraged to watch them grow in the garden. We pray that just like the seeds of Hope planted in the ground, the Word of God would be planted in the hearts and minds of the children served daily at Spanish Lake and at all of Bethlehem's Northside ministry locations! It will certainly not return empty.





Shared Ministry in Southwest Missouri

Shared Ministry is a great way for churches to engage in good stewardship of the gifts and resources that God has given to a congregation. It's also quite adaptable, as there are a variety of ways that churches can engage in shared ministry with one another. In Southwest Missouri, the congregations of Zion Lutheran Church in Bolivar and Our Savior Lutheran Church in Buffalo walk together in shared ministry.

Rev. Jeff Sippy is serving a pastoral call at Zion and Our Savior, which functions as one ministry with two geographic locations. Originally from Seattle, Washington, Pastor Sippy has served in Missouri for many years, including as a vacancy pastor at Our Savior when he got the call to serve in this shared ministry. Pastor Sippy notes, though, he didn't author this shared ministry idea, "Two congregations said, 'what would it look like if you were serving us'. I didn't author or develop it. I just think if you see something or someone in need, what solution do you bring to the table?" The shared ministry conversation started from congregational leaders from Zion and Our Savior early in 2023. Pastor Sippy was looped in November 2023, and officially installed in spring 2024. He serves both congregations, together.

It's a great relationship, with members from both churches invited to studies and events at the other congregation. Each church has a Sunday service. Pastor Sippy starts Sundays with an earlier service in one location, then drives 25 minutes to the next church and has a later morning service. Both congregations are visited by Pastor Sippy every day of the week, and he does visitations, Bible studies, and helps at fellowship and servant events.

It's a beautiful ministry and a great example of how walking together in ministry with other congregations is an excellent way to share resources and help spread the Gospel.

From Friends to Family University Lutheran Chapel of Hope in Cape Girardeau

Students at the Campus Ministry in Cape Girardeau have had a great year! As part of their ministry, they host a free lunch and Bible study on Wednesdays. At the start of the 2023-2024 school year there were many new students to the ministry. Often students would have lunch and leave quickly after the study was completed. But, as the months progressed, the students spent more and more time together. By the time of the Christmas party, students gathered for worship at 3pm, and then stayed well into the night playing games. It's great seeing fellowship of believers coming together like a family!

In the spring, SEMO University held a big event for the total solar eclipse. There were bounce houses, inflatable rock-climbing walls, slides, food trucks, and more. Since the campus ministry at Lutheran Chapel is a registered organization with the university, they are able to participate in on-campus activities. So, Chapel of Hope had a table to meet people and increase visibility on campus. They handed out eclipse themed goodies, like Moon Pies, Milky Way candy bars, and Starbursts. They also handed out pamphlets and Portals of Prayer. Nicely done on a year of campus ministry!

SHINE! has Biggest Year to Date

For the fourth year in a row, the Missouri District held SHINE!—the annual statewide servant event occurring each April. 
