We were thrilled to welcome over 380 participants—Junior High, Senior High, and adult leaders—from across the Missouri District to the 2025 District Youth Gathering, held April 4–6 at Cross Pointe Retreat Center in Rocky Mount, Mo.

This annual event brought together students in grades 6–12 for a weekend filled with worship, learning, service, and fellowship. The theme of the weekend, centered on John 20:31, invited students to deepen their belief in Jesus as the Son of God and to grow in faith as followers of the Triune God—Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

Junior high youth participated in several hands-on projects to share God's love with others. Together, they: created 300 Christian bookmarks with prayers and Bible verses for children and teens in Hooper Bay, Alaska; made 80 salvation bracelets; prepared cross craft kits; wrote encouraging cards and thank-you notes; and stuffed 1,100 Easter eggs to bless children in need.

High school students participated in YouthLead breakout sessions, where 98 peers explored how to support struggling friends using the LOAP (Listen, Observe, Ask, Pray) model through peer-led discussion and practical tools.

The weekend offered a powerful combination of spiritual growth, leadership development, and meaningful connection. It was a blessing to see students live out their faith and return home equipped to shine the light of Christ in their communities.

HAS A BANNER YEAR IN 2024

The end of 2024 wrapped up the third year of MOScholars—Missouri's tax credit program providing scholarships to families of children attending private institutions—and it was our biggest year yet! Thank you to all the taxpayers who participated in this endeavor that has made an impact that will last for eternity. Children throughout the state are now receiving a quality education and hearing the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ at Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) schools.

The Missouri District was able to distribute \$1,088,906 in funds in 2024, resulting in 193 children receiving a full MOScholars scholarship for the current school year. This total amount given, when combined with the funds from the previous two years of the tax credit program, means that more than \$2.3 million has now been awarded to LCMS students by the Missouri District through MOScholars. Praise God!

GO LEADERSHIP RETREAT

The seventh annual GO Leadership Retreat for college students took place from Feb. 28—March 1 at Campus Lutheran in Columbia, and evaluations from participants indicated that the event was very well received. Host Pastor Kent Pierce said that this year's speaker, Pastor Brandon Boos, was highly rated. He noted, "Students appreciated not only the relevance of his topic, which was focused on living out our purpose as followers of Christ, but they also appreciated how the event was structured to be interactive. There was time for worship, study, fellowship, and reflection."

Boos reflected on the retreat, "In a culture overwhelmed by busyness, digital noise, and uncertainty, the retreat offered young adults a rare and refreshing opportunity to slow down, reflect, and listen for God's voice. The retreat opened by tackling the heart of the matter: our identity and purpose in Christ. Through Scripture, participants were reminded that we are image bearers—created not first to do, but to be in relationship with God. With space for reflection, honest questions, and community prayer, the session laid a foundation for living out that identity in their vocation with intention and joy. Throughout the weekend, participants engaged in hard conversations—about doubt, deconstruction, evangelism, and what it means to be a leader. Together, they wrestled with real challenges facing their generation and left with tangible tools to make faith relevant and rooted in today's world."

This year's GO Leadership Retreat hosted 65 participants, representing 10 different colleges. Most participants were from Missouri colleges and universities, with one graduate student from Concordia University Wisconsin. Vendors and guests included: Heit's Point Lutheran Ministries, Lincoln; Concordia Seminary, St. Louis; International Student Ministry, Inc., St. Louis; and the LCMS Office of International Mission.

Empowering Educators: 2025 Spring Early Childhood Conference

Early childhood educators from across Missouri gathered March 1 at Messiah Lutheran School in St. Charles for the annual Missouri District Spring Early Childhood Conference. The event welcomed directors, teachers, and classroom assistants for a day filled with professional development, encouragement, and inspiration rooted in faith and child-centered practices.

Renowned keynote speaker
Amanda Morgan, who writes,

development, kicked off the
conference with her session,
Not Just Cute: Teaching with
Intention for Powerful Play.
Emphasizing the importance of
intentionality, she introduced the
Recognize-Emphasize-Maximize
framework, empowering
educators to turn playful
moments into rich
learning opportunities.

The day continued with insightful breakout sessions tailored to diverse classroom needs. Attendees explored topics such as spiritual development, sensory activities, early childhood resources, special education services, and director collaboration. Presenters like Cheryl Haun, Teresa Wapelhorst, Lisa Krenz, Bev Gruenwald, and speakers from LASE brought decades of experience and practical quidance to support educators in both faith formation and navigating educational systems.

After a lunch sponsored by Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF), Morgan returned for her second keynote, *The Math Bag:* Going Beyond Counting for Real Math Discussions, which challenged participants to reimagine math instruction as an engaging, hands-on dialogue that builds authentic number sense.



From start to finish, the conference highlighted the vital role of relationships, play, and intentional teaching in early childhood education. With a foundation rooted in faith, the event not only equipped educators with valuable tools but also affirmed their calling to nurture young minds and hearts. As Hebrews 13:21 reminds us, may we be equipped with everything good for doing His will as we continue to serve the youngest learners in our care.
