)ear ftiends,

The celebration of Martin Luther's 500th birthday in 1983 began a series of celebrations that have only increased since 2017. June 13, 2025, marks the 500th anniversary of Martin and Katie Luther's wedding. The significance of that event cannot be understated for both the Church and the home.

Luther's action followed the marriage of other pastors supportive of the Reformation, but it also encouraged priests to marry – a topic later addressed in the Augsburg Confession, Article XXIII.

Additionally, Luther's experience as a husband and father deeply influenced his writings throughout the rest of his life. In particular, his doctrine of vocation offered practical applications for Christians living out their unique callings. The Table of Duties in Luther's Small Catechism helps Christians see how they serve God in their vocations—whether in the home, church, or society—according to their God-given positions, including as husbands or wives.

Lutheran theology is not theoretical or cerebral—it is theology for ordinary life. The fact that we are saved by God's grace through faith in Jesus' saving work on the cross means that we are free to serve God in our varied callings. Christians do not have to flee from the world to a monastery or go to the other side of the world to serve as a missionary. We serve God in our church, home, workplaces, and community. From Luther's The Freedom of a Christian to the Table of Duties in Luther's Small Catechism, Luther shows us how to live out our callings from God.

This summer, amidst many wedding and anniversary celebrations, take a moment to give thanks to God for the marriage of Martin and Katie Luther—and for the example of faithful Christians who serve one another in love. May God bless us as we serve one another in all our various callings, especially in the sacred calling of marriage, as husbands and wives, serving one another.

More than 11,000 men, women, and children served this spring in the Missouri District's annual statewide servant event rooted in Matt. 5:16. Now in its fifth year, *SHINE!* 2025 set new records for both the number of participants and registered groups. Although the official window for service ran from April 4–13, many groups continued serving well into May.

SHINE! encourages people of all ages, skill sets, and group sizes to share the light of Christ by serving their neighbors. "Serving the neighbor is part of what our faith is. It's what Jesus has instructed: to love your neighbor as He has loved us," says Rev. Steve Andrews of St. Matthew Lutheran Church in Lee's Summit. Members of his congregation served at a food pantry, assembled hygiene kits, and delivered cookies to local fire stations.

Many participants wore the official *SHINE!* t-shirt, thanks to the generosity of our sponsors including Rod's Sports & Apparel, Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF), Concordia Plans, The Lutheran Church–Missouri Synod's (LCMS) Disaster Response, and Timothy Lutheran Church in Blue Springs. With most service projects taking place during Lent, wearing purple was a fitting visual reminder of the Church Year season.

Amanda Cole, Principal at Springfield Lutheran School, and her staff provided a meal for students attending Missouri State University. "We do this because of our love for Him," she said. "It's such a great way to encourage our brothers and sisters in Christ. And to those who maybe don't know about Christ, what an opportunity for them to see others serving."

What began in Missouri in 2021 is now growing beyond state lines. In 2023, the Northern Illinois District joined in *SHINE!* efforts and the Nebraska District joined a year later in 2024. Mental Health Awareness in the Missouri District

May is recognized as Mental Health Awareness Month in Missouri, offering a timely opportunity, following Easter, to reflect on the hope of Christ's resurrection and the ongoing need for emotional and spiritual care, especially for those serving in ministry. To support church and school workers, the Missouri District is partnering with Concordia Plans to offer free, nationally accredited Adult Mental Health First Aid training. While the **June 6 session is now full**, additional opportunities are available **Aug. 1 and 8.** This virtual training equips participants to recognize mental health symptoms, respond to crises, and connect others with appropriate care. Topics include signs of mental, emotional, and relational fatigue and challenges; trauma and resilience; crisis response; and self-care strategies. The training consists of two hours of self-paced pre-work (due 48 hours prior) and a one-day, 6.5-hour live virtual session. <u>Register here!</u>



Building Support Teams for Workers

Congregations are also encouraged to form church and school worker support teams to foster healthy, ongoing environments of mutual encouragement. One such model is active at Holy Cross Lutheran Church in O'Fallon, inspired by *Holding Up the Prophet's Hands* by Rev. Dr. Bruce Hartung. A YouTube video resource is available to assist you in developing a **Church Worker Support Team** in your ministry.
