#### **2025 PASTORS CONFERENCE**

The Missouri District held its 2025 Pastors Conference at Margaritaville Lake Resort, Osage Beach, Oct. 12–14. The opening Divine Service was held at Christ the King Lutheran Church, Lake Ozark, Sunday evening led by Senior Pastor Rev. Ron Lehenbauer, with a sermon by Interim District President Rev. Craig Otto on how Jesus spoke of Himself in Luke 24. A brass ensemble and choir from the congregation provided special music for the service.

Monday's opening devotions were led by Second Vice President Rev. Randy Asburry, focusing on how John the Baptist spoke of Christ. The plenary speaker, pictured left, was Rev. Dr. Reed Lessing, professor of Theology and Ministry at Concordia University, St. Paul, Minn., who led pastors through the book of Amos with the theme "Restore the Roar." His engaging style, knowledge of the book, and summaries set to the tune of Amazing Grace made it a memorable day of learning about the prophet and applications for today.

Eighteen exhibitors were present in the adjoining hall, including Concordia Publishing House (CPH), Lutheran Church Extension Fund (LCEF), Lutheran Emergency Response Team (LERT), Missouri District Family Discipleship, Concordia Center for the Family, Alliance Defending Freedom, and other Lutheran agencies and Recognized Service Organizations (RSOs).

Interim District President Rev. Craig Otto presented the president's report, starting with a video from District President Rev. Dr. R. Lee Hagan, followed by a detailed update on operations and ministry during this interim time. The report closed with updates from Chief Financial Officer Peter Krege. Monday's session was capped off with Gemütlichkeit on the Windgate Plaza, allowing for fellowship and reunions between attendees.

Third Vice President Rev. Samuel Powell led Tuesday's opening devotion on how Stephen spoke of Christ. Nominations were received for the triennium Conference Committee, and the following were elected:

- Senior Pastor Rev. Andrew Tessone at Our Savior Lutheran Church in Sedalia

Three breakout sessions were held, each offering eight options on topics. Fourth Vice President Rev. Rick Cody led the closing devotion on how the Apostle Paul spoke of Christ. A fruitful time of learning and fellowship was enjoyed by all church workers and families who attended the 2025 Pastors Conference.

A highlight of this year's Convocation was the joyful participation of **182** students who brought their voices and instruments to worship. Together, the combined high school choir, wind symphony, and elementary choir represented Lutheran High Schools North, South, St. Charles, and Metro East from the Southern Illinois District and several St. Louis area Lutheran elementary schools and Lutheran home school students. Their gift of music filled the Convocation hall with praise and set a tone of celebration for all who attended.

Adding to the celebration were student mascots and cheerleaders from Immanuel in Wentzville, St. John's in Ellisville, Salem in Black Jack, Christ Community Lutheran School in St. Louis, and Lutheran High School St. Charles. Their spirited presence reminded everyone that Lutheran schools are filled not only with academic excellence but also with contagious joy and community pride.

This remarkable event was made possible through the dedication of **201** adult volunteers representing **18** LCMS districts and two international Lutheran schools. From registration teams, to ushers, to hospitality setup, their joyful service created an atmosphere of warmth and welcome for every attendee.

Thanks are due to the greeting teams from Immanuel in Olivette who helped set a welcoming tone on that first day, along with the energetic "Meet Me in St. Louis" Fun Squad from Messiah in Weldon Spring, who brought laughter, fellowship, and local hospitality to Friday evening's celebration. #### **Tax Credits Available for 2025**

Benjamin Franklin once wrote, "In this world nothing can be said to be certain, except death and taxes." As children of God, we know that the former is a non-issue because of Jesus Christ. As Missourians, the latter is now simply a tool we use to spread the Gospel.

MOScholars is a tax credit program that provides scholarships for qualified K-12 students attending private institutions in our state. The Missouri District is one of only six organizations with access to these funds. Since its inception in July of 2022, hundreds of students attending LCMS schools throughout the District have been blessed by this program.

A huge thank you to the many households and businesses that have directed their tax dollars to support Lutheran education! MOScholars tax credits are dollar-for-dollar, and taxpayers can participate at a level up to 50% of their tax liability in a given year. There's no additional cost for participating, and it takes just minutes to complete the process.

Credits are still available for the 2025 tax year. Taxpayers have until Dec. 31 to take the following quick steps:

- Reserve tax credits by following the prompts at https://mo.lcms.org/tax-credit.
- Send in the funds in the amount of the reservation by check, money order, or electronic funds transfer (link available on landing page).

# SHARED MINISTRY WITH phil's friends

Good Shepherd Lutheran Church in Cape Girardeau, Mo., recently hired Jackson Sprague for a shared ministry post between the congregation and Phil's Friends, a Recognized Service Organization of The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS). Phil's Friends is based in Crown Point, Ind., and prepares care packages and cards to uplift patients suffering with cancer, as well as engaging volunteers in spiritual conversations to encourage the patients.

Sprague came from Cartersville, Ill., to Cape Girardeau two years ago to finish his bachelor's degree at Southeast Missouri State University. He and his wife joined Good Shepherd earlier this year, and he went on a mission trip to Belize this year with the congregation. Pastor Weston Wildauer says, "That led to conversations about his interest in full-time ministry involvement overseas or stateside. Since the congregation had been recruiting for this shared ministry position for the past seven months, it seemed like a good fit to encourage him toward this shared ministry post with Phil's Friends right here at home."

For two days each week, volunteers from Good Shepherd bring comfort and hope to patients at the St. Francis Hospital infusion center—cleaning rooms, handing out drinks, talking, praying, and directing to Christ. The volunteers also distribute Phil's Friends cancer care packages.

Sprague will take on leadership of that program, with the hope of growing the ministry to operate every day of the week, expanding to other hospitals, and recruiting volunteers from other area churches. He will also travel throughout the area and state to give chapel talks, presentations to Lutheran Women in Mission (LWML) and church groups. He is scheduled to be a speaker at the Missouri District LWML Convention in Cape Girardeau in June 2026.

The April Missouri SHINE! projects have involved many Missouri LCMS congregations in packing Phil's Friends care packages and writing cards to cancer patients, including fifth- through eighth-grade students from nearby Trinity Lutheran School in Cape Girardeau. Sprague will also help to coordinate those events in future years.

For the congregation, Sprague will help to oversee food distributions, mission trips, and other community engagement projects.

#### Adult Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) Training Jan. 23, June 6, or Aug. 7, 2026

In partnership with Concordia Plans, the District offers Nationally Accredited MHFA training at no cost. Participants will learn to recognize signs of mental illness, understand trauma and resilience, respond to mental health crises, and practice self-care. The training includes 7 hours of virtual instruction plus about 2 hours of pre-work. Registration is required by Jan. 12, 2026 for the first Jan. 23 training.

Pastors and church workers are invited for a restorative retreat. This opportunity provides worship, time for reflection, renewal, and connection with colleagues in ministry.
