“Revisiting the Doctrine of Vocation: Luther’s Instruction on the Christian Life”

Presented by: [Rev. Dr. Jason Lane](#)

The doctrine of vocation has made a resurgence ever since the Luther Renaissance of the late 19th century. In the LCMS, Luther’s teaching of “one’s calling” has been popularized among pastors by Gustaf Wingren’s study, “Luther on Vocation” (1958). More recently, Gene Edward Veith Jr.’s books, “Spirituality of the Cross” and “God at Work: Your Christian Vocation in All of Life,” have made Wingren’s study and Luther’s teaching on love of the neighbor more accessible to laity. These helpful treatments of Luther’s thinking on the Christian life seek to address the apparent and persistent problem with Lutheran theology: that our emphasis on faith alone leaves Lutherans lacking in sanctification and good works. Under the theme of “Live as You Are Called” we will examine God’s will for our Christian life in Christ based on Scripture, the Lutheran Confessions, and Luther’s writings.

In the first session, I will present the doctrine of vocation from Scripture and the Lutheran Confessions and offer a critical reading of Wingren based on Luther’s writings. I will attempt to demonstrate that our vocabulary today concerning “call” or “calling” has evolved beyond Scripture and the Confessions and has sometimes caused more confusion than clarity for our people and our churches.

The term “calling” in the sense of station in life or the way one is set in relationship to others, as found in 1 Cor. 7:20, cannot be understood apart from the call of the gospel and the ministry of the church through which God awakens faith, forgives sins, and gives eternal life. Where faith is established the fruits of faith—including love, duty, and service for others—flourish. Where love and duty are demanded without faith, sinners become trapped in the Law by either pride or despair. Therefore, St. Paul writes, “live as you are called,” that is, live as you are called by the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ and in the forgiveness of your sins.

Too often, those serving others delay seeking encouragement and care for themselves until they are deeply exhausted or struggling.

Participants will be encouraged to recognize the value of healthy support systems, appropriate boundaries, resilience in ministry, and faithful self-care practices that strengthen long-term service to Christ and His Church. Practical tools and strategies will be discussed to help pastors and church workers navigate ministry pressures while continuing to serve with faithfulness, wisdom, and hope.

The two Greek versions of Esther both add 6 significant blocks of material and make many other changes throughout the Hebrew text. In these additions and changes, God, prayer, and obvious piety are inserted into a challenging book that never mentions God and has no obvious piety or prayer practiced by the main characters. Jerome and Luther both removed the additions and reverted to using the Hebrew text. This presentation describes the changes and argues that the Hebrew Esther without explicit references to God, prayer, and piety is more powerful in our Christian lives than the Greek versions that try to spell it all out.

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D-04: FORO: An Opportunity to Plug Into Mission to Extend the Kingdom of God in a Particular Place

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“Revisiting the Doctrine of Vocation: Luther’s Instruction on the Christian Life”

The doctrine of vocation has made a resurgence ever since the Luther Renaissance of the late 19th century. In the LCMS, Luther’s teaching of “one’s calling” has been popularized among pastors by Gustaf Wingren’s study, “Luther on Vocation” (1958). More recently, Gene Edward Veith Jr.’s books, “Spirituality of the Cross” and “God at Work: Your Christian Vocation in All of Life,” have made Wingren’s study and Luther’s teaching on love of the neighbor more accessible to laity. These helpful treatments of Luther’s thinking on the Christian life seek to address the apparent and persistent problem with Lutheran theology: that our emphasis on faith alone leaves Lutherans lacking in sanctification and good works. Under the theme of “Live as You Are Called” we will examine God’s will for our Christian life in Christ based on Scripture, the Lutheran Confessions, and Luther’s writings.

The term “calling” in the sense of station in life or the way one is set in relationship to others, as found in 1 Cor. 7:20, cannot be understood apart from the call of the gospel and the ministry of the church through which God awakens faith, forgives sins, and gives eternal life. Where faith is established the fruits of faith—including love, duty, and service for others—flourish. Where love and duty are demanded without faith, sinners become trapped in the Law by either pride or despair. Therefore, St. Paul writes, “live as you are called,” that is, live as you are called by the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ and in the forgiveness of your sins.

He grew up in the woods of central Massachusetts and married his pastor's youngest daughter. He and his wife, Marta, are blessed with ten children: six girls and four boys.
